Mercury **Contamination** in the Boroo River

The fate of the Boroo River hangs in the balance, threatened by at least 10 tonnes of toxic mercury. Robin Grayson, the General Director of the joint Mongolian-British venture, Eco-Minex International Co. Ltd. (EMI), reports that his business partner. Dr. Tumenbayar. show that over time, enormous amounts of mercury have leaked into the soil beneath the factory, and were lost in the shiese into the river. For every tonne of gold recovered, at least at tonne of mercury was lost.


EMI estimates that a worrying 10 tonnes of mercury is now in the soil beneath the ruins of the factory, under adjacent grazing land and beneath the corner of a cereal field. The mercury is there




Mercury being heated over a Ger Stove


