Artisanal and Small-scale Mining...

ASM: An Opportunity for Rural Development ?

Artisanal and Small scale Mining (ASM) is largely a poverty driven activity practiced in some of the world's poorest regions. If tapped, it has the potential to contribute significantly to social and economic development.

Artisanal and small-scale mining (ASM) is one of the most important livelihood activities in Africa. An estimated 9 million artisanal and small-scale miners are engaged in ASM activities across 45 countries of the continent. With their dependents they may number over 54 million and account for almost 6% of the population of Africa. Worldwide, these numbers are most likely in excess of 20 million ASM miners and 100 million dependents.¹



Despite the actual and potential economic value of this livelihood, ASM communities are amongst the poorest, most marginalized and vulnerable members of society. All too often, ASM is associated with conflicts, corruption, civil strife, child labor, hazardous practices, disastrous impacts on the environment and civil

strife. In spite of progresses during the last two decades, it is still too often illegal. The ASM communities are indeed exposed to the negative effects of successive international or regional crises, such as the present commodity prices or financial crises, conflicts or climate change.

Yet, it offers real opportunities to alleviate poverty, mostly in rural areas. The challenge facing civil society, the industry, governments and the artisanal miners themselves is to find ways to boost the economic value and livelihood potential of ASM and mitigate the often grim realities of life around the mines. There is a growing field of evidence from Latin America, mostly, but also from Asia and – yes – Africa – that ASM can become a viable trade and also contribute to local community and economic development.

The 2009 Annual Conference on Communities and Artisanal & Small-scale Mining will highlight how sustainable solutions are emerging in Mozambique, in Africa and around the world. It will show why and how political will is important – as the Mozambique experience will illustrate – to formalize ASM and transform a hazardous activity into a viable livelihood for the artisanal miners and the communities depending on them.

After Mongolia in 2007 and Brazil in 2008, the 9th Annual CASM is back this year to Africa.

The Conference Structure

This year, the conference will take place in two different cities — Maputo from September 8–10 and Chimoio from September 12–14:



In Maputo, at the Joaquim Chissano Conference Center, the conference will focus on the global issues – such as the vulnerability of ASM to commodity prices and the financial crises, to conflicts or climate change – and on international or regional initiatives and experiences for example fair trade and certification schemes, the treaty on reduction of mercury pollution under preparation or good business practices in the often conflictive relationships between largescale mines and ASM, or new trends regarding community development, financing of ASM and other themes. Regional and national presentations related to formalization of ASM and outreach experiences will allow the participants to compare lessons learned, with a particular

focus on Mozambique (September 8) and on Africa (September 10) during the 2009 CASM Africa Day.

► The Chimoio agenda will let the participants to become familiar with on the ground experiences and the challenges faced by the artisanal miners and will provide the opportunity – through open space discussions and workshops, at the *Milpak Hotel* on September 12; and field trips around Chimoio on September 13 and 14 – of a closer understanding and On site involvement with ASM miners.

Main Themes and Agenda

ASM is characterized bydiversity.

No wonder that it is practically impossible to include in a nutshell definition all the different types of minerals — from construction materials and coal to gold and gemstones — or socio-political environments — from peaceful and legal to part of armed conflicts and lawless or historical background — from traditional and absence of competition for resources to invasive and extreme conflict for minerals land — or geographical settings — from lowland jungles to high mountains — and so on. The series of themes included in the CASM conferences reflect such variety. Still, some basic principles will emerge, for example the critical importance of formalization and legalization of the activity, or organization of the miners in associations and need for management capacity building.

Then, a number of initiatives and tools, depending on the specific conditions at each site, will allow the artisanal and small-scale miners to mitigate hazards and improve their income — technical and environmental management, elimination of child labor, fair trade — and the surrounding communities would better benefit from the activity – community driven development, diversification. Also the need to reduce the vulnerability of ASM communities to external economic or political shocks or crises is critical.

The different sessions of the conference will include presentations on the basic principles — their implementation is never as easy as it sounds! — as well as around many of the present initiatives and experiences aiming at transforming ASM into a development opportunity. The main themes at the 2009 ACC will include:

- ASM and rural development: integration of ASM into local economic development, with examples from Mozambique and elsewhere in Africa or the world;
- Vulnerability of ASM to the external shocks: climate change, commodity prices volatility and financial crises, conflicts, for example in the DRC or Sierra Leone;
- "Small (mining) is beautiful", with examples of success stories in Ecuador, Latin America and elsewhere;
- "Mining together": good business approaches or why it is important for large-scale mining as part of their Corporate Social Responsibility policy to work together, under the right circumstances, with ASM towards local economic development;
- Mercury and ASM gold mining: the UNEP treaty under preparation to reduce Hg pollution implies a renewed effort to improve technologies accessible to artisanal mining;
- National, regional and international presentations on progresses regarding the ASM sector, with a particular focus on Africa, with many countries sharing their initiatives and experiences at the 2009 CASM Africa Day.
- CASM at a crossroad: as part of the preparation of the 2010 and 2011 United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development (UNCSD), CASM will facilitate the presentation of progresses made during the last decade and a preliminary draft paper will be discussed.

The complete agenda is still a "work in progress" and will be posted as soon as it is finalized.

Munhena is located 85 km from Chimoio city and 15km from Manica Village. The ore is a fracture quartz vein in a steep slope of the mount Munhena. The miners are organized in an association that was formed in 2001. The association has 157 members. This association was financially and technically assisted by the Ministry through the World Bank-funded project. The Ministry established a communal processing plant for the association.

Recently the association celebrated a Joint Venture contract with a South African group (the Capital Investment), in a 25% for the Association and 75% for the company agreement. Presently the JV is carrying out experimental mining and planning a proper mine setting.



Gold panning and processing at Munhena site



Crispin is a private mining operation (Clean Mining) mining gold in banded iron formations and alluvium along the Revue River catchments. The mine operates a processing plant (crusher, mill, and sluice).

They produce between 500 and 1000 gr. of gold per month.

The Nhamatanda site is located in the Sofala Province, 100 km from Chimoio city and 100 km from Beira city. The association of Nhamatanda has 300 members and they mine alluvial gold.

National Park of Gorongosa

The Gorongosa National Park (GNP) is located 150 km from Chimoio city and 80 from Nhamatanda. The GNP is one of the main tourist attractions in Mozambique, it has a wide variety of animals and plants, comprising a unique ecosystem.

The paving rhyolite mine mined in the Namahacha District, 65 Km from Maputo. The main market for this ornamental stone is Maputo city.


Bentonite mine in Boane




Flight and Accommodations

About Mozambique...

Geography

Mozambique is situated on the southeast coast of Africa. To the east is the Indian Ocean; Tanzania, Malawi, and Zambia are to the north; to the west is Zimbabwe and South Africa; and to the south, Swaziland and South Africa. The total area of Mozambique is 799,380 km², with a coastline along the Indian Ocean of over 2515 kilometers.

Mozambique overall is relatively low and flat. The highest points are in the mountainous region located by the Zimbabwe border. There, Massururero on the slopes of Manica and Sofala is 2436 meters high, Picos Namuli has an altitude of 2419 meters, and Serra de Gorongosa is 2000 meters high.

History and Politics

Mozambique became independent from the Portuguese colonial regime on June 25, 1975 after 10 years of war. Samora Moises Machel assumed leadership and become the first President of the Republic of Mozambigue. In the 1980s, civil war broke out between the government and RENAMO (National Resistance Party of Mozambigue) and lasted for 15 years, until October 4, 1992 when both parties signed a peace accord. The first democratic elections took place in December 1994, at which time President Joaquim Alberto Chissano obtained victory. Mozambique today is a democratic country holding its own elections as foreseen in the Constitution. The current President is Armando Emílio Guebuza who took office in January 2005.

Culture

Due to its strategic position in the southern part of the African continent, and its easily accessible long coastline and its fertile land, Mozambique has been the home of various peoples and cultures, including Bantu from central Africa, Arabs, Indians, and Europeans. The Bantu are made up of a number of different groups with a common culture and similar dialects. The main ethnic groups include "Aianas", "Macuas", "Angones", "Nhanjas", "Tongas", "Batongas" and "Muchopes," who are found along the country in this same order, from north to south. Small numbers of Indians and Europeans are also to be found in various parts of the country.

At present, the population of Mozambique is estimated to be 20 million, 20% of which live in the main urban centers of Maputo, Beira and Nampula. Portuguese is the official language spoken throughout the country, with 13 other main national languages (Emakhuwa, Xitsonga, Ciyao, Cisena, Cishona, Echuwabo, Cinyanja, Xironga, Shimaconde, Cinyungue, Cichopi, Bitonga, and Kiswahili). English is taught in secondary school, and it's reasonably easy to find English speakers in the main urban areas. In rural areas, many people do not speak Portuguese or English.



About Mozambique...

Climate/Weather

The climate of Mozambique, influenced by the monsoons from the Indian Ocean and the hot current of the Mozambique Channel, is generally tropical and humid. The dry season in the Centre/North lasts for four to six months, whereas in the South it lasts 6-9 months. The rainy season is between October and April.

Average temperatures are around 20°C in the south and 26°C in the north. The temperatures in September are 17°C and 26°C in Maputo and 15°C and 27°C in Chimoio. The highest temperatures are normally registered during the rainy seasons. Overall, it is cooler in the limited mountainous areas.

Country Requires Yellow Fever Vaccination

The Mozambican Interior and Health Ministries decreed on September 10, 2007 that all travelers entering Mozambique from any of the 43 countries where yellow fever is known to exist must present a valid certification of vaccine against this disease.

Any passenger who cannot present such a certificate at his or her point of entry will be vaccinated at the cost of 1,350.00 Meticais (about 54 USD) to benefit the National Health Service.

Diseases

Mozambique has a HIV/AIDS prevalence rate of 16.2%.

Mozambique is also a malaria prone area, thus it is recommended that visitors exercise precautionary measures.



General Information on Mozambique

Airports

A well laid out airport system makes domestic air travel within Mozambique quick and safe.

The international airports of Maputo, Beira, Pemba, Vilanculos and Nampula have connections to Johannesburg, Harare, Dar-Es Salaam, Nairobi, and Lisbon.

Border Posts

The existing posts are at Ressano Garcia (06h00-00h00), Namaacha (07h00-20h00), Ponta d'Ouro (07h30-17h30), Machipanda (06h00-18h00), Cuchamano (06h00-18h00), Zóbwè (06h00-18h00), Milange (06h00-18h00), and Mandimba (06h00-18h00). It is recommended that visitors arrive well before the stipulated closing times, preferably with a valid visa (see Visa below).

Country Working Hours

The Government and public institutions are open Monday-Friday from 07:30 am to 03:30 pm. UN Agencies and some NGOs are open Monday to Thursday from 08:00 am to 04:00 pm and Fridays from 08:00 am to 01:00 pm. Shops are open Monday-Friday from 08:30 am to 06:000 pm and Saturdays from 08:30 am to 01:30 pm.

Currency

The local currency is the Metical (plural, meticais). Dollars and Rand are accepted in many places in larger towns. Exchange is available in banks and exchange agencies.

Credit cards are accepted in most formal establishments, and <u>traveler's cheques</u> are acceptable at **some** banks and a **few** hotels, though with high fees. [As of May 18, 2009 the exchange rate was 1 USD = 26.95 Mt]

Customs

Upon arrival, visitors must declare those articles subject to customs duties. Personal items are not subject to tax. Custom free allowance is 400 cigarettes or 250gr of tobacco, 1 liter of spirits, 2.25L of wine and 50ml of perfume. The total value of these products must not exceed 50 USD. People under the age of 18 are not allowed to carry alcohol or tobacco. Narcotics and pornographic material are prohibited. Transport of arms must have special license.

Driving

In Mozambique driving is on the left. All drivers must carry the following documents: identification, driver's license, car registration, third party insurance, when applicable a temporary import license for towing caravans, boats, etc. The wearing of seat belts is obligatory. If you are a car driver, an emergency triangle is mandatory.

Electrical Supply

Local voltage is 220/240 V 50 Hz, and the round two pin prongs are the standard.

Identification

It is obligatory to carry identification at all times.

You should carry with you your passport, or preferably an authenticated photocopy of the main pages.

Language

The official language is Portuguese. In general local people understand and speak some English, especially in towns. Outside the urban areas, each region has its own dialect.

Post Office

Post offices are throughout the main urban centers. Express Mail, such as DHL and EMS, is also available.

Telephones

The local landline telephone system is fairly reliable, and direct regional and international connections are available. The country prefix is 258 followed by the city code. The main city codes are: Maputo (21), Sofala/ Beira (23), Manica/Chimoio (251).

Mobile coverage is quickly expanding. Most towns and areas around them are now accessible. There are two mobile operators, Mcel (82) and Vodacom (84). To call a cell number using international dialing, dial 258 82 or 258 84, followed by the number.

Visas

Visitors should obtain a visa from a Mozambique Consulate or Embassy before arrival. Visas can also be obtained at the borders but this is not encouraged. The current cost of a single visa at the borders or at the Maputo or Beira International Airports is 25 USD for countries with a Mozambique Consulate or Embassy. For those with no Consulate or Embassy, the cost is 20 USD. The cost of a multiple-entry visa is 65 USD.

Countries with visa exemptions are: Botswana, Malawi, South Africa, Swaziland, Tanzania, Zambia, and Zimbabwe.
